My First Impressions of Sharon's Upcoming Novel: Bargains of Fate Guest Columnist, KM Brown Bestselling author Sharon Virts is deep into writing *Bargains of Fate*, the longawaited sequel to *Masque of Honor*. This novel, the second in what will become part of the *Fields of Honor* series, continues the story of Jack McCarty following his infamous duel with Armistead Mason. As Sharon has developed the plot and character arcs, *Bargains of Fate* has emerged as the perfect title for this chapter in Jack's journey.

Right now, Sharon is 75,000+ words into the 100,000 she owes her publisher, steadily working toward the manuscript's completion. Readers can expect the novel to launch around this time next year. But before *Bargains of Fate* hits shelves, *Masque of Honor* will be re-released with scenes that were not included in the original publication—offering fans a deeper look into Jack McCarty's world and setting the stage for what's to come.

Opening in 1822, *Bargains of Fate* picks up with Jack and Lucinda now married. However, Jack struggles with his identity and his place in society. He doesn't want to be known simply as a brave man of the dueling field—he wants respect for something greater. But fate has other plans, and despite his desires, Jack *may* find himself once again facing a challenge that forces him back to the field of honor.

This book brings back many familiar faces, including Lucinda, Sally, William, and Emily. However, new characters and expanded roles for others will deepen the intrigue and tension. Lucinda's sister, Fanny Lee, plays a more significant role in this novel, as do Jack's two best friends, James Dulaney and Dr. Cary Seldon. New characters such as Jack's cousin, Dennis McCarty, and James' cousin, French Beatty, along with his wife Josephine—who is notably the niece of Henry Clay—add layers of complexity and political entanglement to the story.

Themes of murder, infidelity, and an unexpected legal entanglement drive Jack and those closest to him toward life-altering decisions. A corrupt and spiteful bargain threatens everything Jack holds dear, leaving him to face difficult choices that could change the course of his family's destiny.


